DISASTER RESPONSE AND REFUGEE HEALTHCARE

Between July 7 and September 30, over 188,600 refugees entered Uganda, fleeing violence in South Sudan.

90% of refugees are women and children

Refugees entering Uganda **each day** has increased dramatically.



Uganda staff are performing **3,000 health screenings per day** as well as **direct medical services, training and capacity building at 5 reception centers** in partnership with the Ministry of Health.



HEALTHY CHILDREN AND SAFE MOTHERHOOD



In Liberia, Medical Teams is partnering with the Ministry of Health and UNICEF to **train Community Health Workers to provide maternal, newborn, and child health services to households more than one hour walk from a health facility.**

September accomplishments in Sinoe and Grand Kru counties:



257 pregnant women referred to a clinic for delivery




244 healthcare workers trained


FISCAL YEAR 2016 BUDGET vs. YEAR-TO-DATE ACTUAL (JULY - SEPT)

Esther Abau and Able

As told by Joe DiCarlo, VP of Programs




I want to introduce you to Esther Abau, a very strong and courageous woman. Esther comes from South Sudan, from the town of Yei. She is now a refugee. When the fighting started in Yei and gunshots were too close to ignore, Esther's husband wanted her to flee to Uganda. Esther was 9 months pregnant. For Esther's safety and the safety of her baby, arrangements were made for Esther to leave for Uganda while her husband stayed in South Sudan with plans to follow after her.

Esther is a teacher and speaks English very well. She explained to me how she left everything behind and came to Uganda with only one bag. Esther arrived at Rhino Camp and gave birth to a beautiful boy just the day before my visit in Medical Teams' maternity ward. She told me she's not sure what to name her son, but is thinking of the name Able... "Because God is able to do all things, and I am able to do all things through Christ. I am thinking of calling him Able for this reason." Esther went on to say, "I am so thankful to God for this health facility. It is a real blessing to have you [Medical Teams] here. I ran so quickly from South Sudan, arrived at the camp, and gave birth to my son. I have had no time to dry my tears."


