



A grandmother's love and dedication—along with the medicine, clinic and nutritionist you helped provide—healed young David.

At four years old, David didn't have much time left to live. Living in an abusive and unstable household, he wasn't receiving the care a little child needs. He became severely malnourished. Eventually, David was abandoned and left in the care of his grandmother, Kedress.

Kedress' heart broke for her grandson—she knew he was dying. She tried to treat him with herbs, but he wasn't improving. She was desperate for help. And that's when it showed up on her doorstep—in the form of a Medical Teams

Community Health Worker. They saw David was in urgent need of medical care and encouraged Kedress to take him to a Medical Teams clinic.

When David arrived at the clinic, he was in severe pain. His skin was peeling off, and he was swollen all over. When the Medical Teams nutritionist saw David come in, she dropped everything to treat him. She started David on antibiotics and milk



formula and checked on him every four hours. Slowly, he regained his strength. For two weeks, Kedress sat by David's side as he received intensive care.

Finally, David was healthy enough to be sent home. But his care didn't end there. He still needed therapeutic food to continue recovering. Every week, Kedress walked two hours each way to collect his food. She explained that her love for David drove her to do whatever it took to make sure he recovered. Kedress believes David can be something great. She believes God saved his life for a reason.

And David is not just special to his grandmother. He also touched the hearts of several Medical Teams staff. One was Robert Businge, a Health Officer. Robert described how bright David is—without having ever attended school, he understands five languages. "That means this boy, if well cared about, could be something important for the community," Robert explained. "Anything is possible. David can be anything."

## Covid-19

While COVID-19 took the world by surprise, at Medical Teams, we were ready to respond—thanks to the generous support of people like you. With more than 40 years of experience responding to deadly epidemics like Ebola, cholera, and HIV/ AIDS, we were made for such a time as this.

In the Pacific Northwest, you helped quickly stand up drive-thru testing clinics for vulnerable populations. Your support also helped distribute desperately needed personal protective equipment to local healthcare workers.

Around the world, you helped send masks to refugees, build isolation and treatment centers and provide over one million screenings. You also helped train more than 4,600 Community Health Workers—refugees themselves—to go door to door providing contact tracing and widespread



## Hamidur

## Because of you, Hamidur, a refugee in Bangladesh, recovered from COVID-19.

Hamidur had a good life in Myanmar. He lived in a small village with his brothers, sister and mother. His family owned three grocery shops, and Hamidur volunteered his time with the Red Cross. All of that changed in 2017 when the military began burning villages and arresting civilians. Hamidur witnessed horrific violence. When his brother was arrested, the family decided they had to flee the country.

"Leaving behind my shops, beloved homeland and brother—who was in jail—was the worst feeling one person can feel. It was like seeing a bit of hell," Hamidur said.

Life was not easy living in a crowded refugee camp in Bangladesh. And then the COVID-19 pandemic hit. What started as a rash for Hamidur progressed to a cough and difficulty breathing. He was referred to a Medical Teams-supported clinic where he tested positive for COVID-19.

Hamidur was immediately admitted to the newly opened Medical Teams COVID-19 isolation and treatment center. There—because of the support you provided—he received oxygen, food and antiviral medicines.



"I got really weak and lost lots of weight before," Hamidur explains. "After getting treatment [at the Medical Teams clinic], now I feel much better. I am getting in shape and gaining weight back. Now I have no dizziness or rashes, I can continue my job. They prescribed me some medicines which are helping. I can feel the difference in me."

Hamidur, who spends his days as a Community Outreach Mobilizer, is now able to get back to work. During an uncertain time, as the virus raged around the world and in his own body, Hamidur received loving care that helped him regain his strength.

# Refugee Crisis

Imagine the chaos of frantically gathering your family and running. Hoping you're not caught before you reach safety. People forced from home have survived so much. It is unacceptable that they should get to safety only to die from a treatable illness.

Like Jesus, you help welcome the sick, the injured and the afraid. You provide loving care to prevent and treat deadly illnesses. Because of you, families are spared more suffering and loss. You also empower refugees with health knowledge that they can share with their neighbors.





# Thanks to you, Haifa is receiving the medical care she needs to live with diabetes.

Haifa remembers when she was diagnosed with diabetes at the local hospital in Syria. She learned she needed daily insulin injections to control her dangerous glucose spikes. The violence of the Syrian civil war raged around her, making her condition more difficult to manage and medicine harder to come by.

One day, armed gunmen stormed her school, looking for weapons. That traumatic experience triggered a reaction in Haifa, causing her diabetes to worsen. She developed hyperglycemia which made her constantly thirsty and caused her heart to pound in her chest.

Haifa's mother made the difficult decision to leave Syria; she knew it was the only way to save her daughter's life.

Now, Haifa and her family live in a crowded refugee settlement in Lebanon. But Medical Teams is also there. With your support, Haifa's mother has been trained as a Refugee Outreach Volunteer and can recognize the symptoms of hyperglycemia and diabetes in Haifa. She shares her knowledge to help her neighbors too—"People are the doctors of themselves, so I learned from (our) experience."



Haifa still struggles with her diabetes. Jobs for refugees are in short supply. It's difficult for Haifa's father to pay for insulin for his daughter and food for the family.

With COVID-19 spreading, Haifa is at high risk, so she stays in the tent with her mother and siblings. She prays for a future when life is less stressful, and her family can worry less about money, food and disease.

Because of your support, Medical Teams can supply Haifa with the glucose strips she needs to monitor her condition. She is learning how to eat a healthy diet. Because of you, there is a glimmer of hope for Haifa.

# Disaster Response

Some of the worst disasters in the world today are caused by conflict. Countries welcoming refugees are often overwhelmed trying to meet the immense need for medical care. That's why we work in places like Lebanon and Uganda, countries with large refugee populations. Your support provides life-saving care and relieves pressure on local health systems.

Natural and sudden disasters also unleash chaos. Your generosity brings healing amid devastation.
Last year, you helped send aid to survivors of Hurricane Laura, the Beirut explosion, and the West Coast wildfires. You sent hygiene kits with items like antiseptic wipes, soap, toothbrushes and toothpaste. Although these supplies seem basic, they are crucial for preventing the spread of disease and helping survivors stay healthy.









## You sent relief to Donna in her greatest moment of need.

"There's nothing left—it's all ash," said Donna, describing the remains of her hometown of Detroit, Oregon as she waited in the United Way office in Salem. Donna was among the thousands of people evacuated as deadly wildfires engulfed towns up and down the West Coast in September.

When the Beachie Creek Fire was burning in Central Oregon, her community was on Level 2 Alert. She and her partner were prepared to leave the next day. But at midnight, they received an urgent message—go now.

They had no time to pack and left with only the clothes on their backs. They lost everything—their belongings, their car. Now, they're having to start again, but they're grateful to have a place to stay while they rebuild their lives.

Incredibly, when we met her in Salem, Donna was there to give back by picking up and distributing hygiene kits to wildfire evacuees like herself.

Medical Teams had partnered with United Way to source and pack 200 hygiene kits and Goodwill gift cards for evacuees. Each kit contained essential items—toothpaste, toothbrush, shampoo, soap—enough to last one person for a month.

You helped ensure those kits were available to evacuees right away. When her world had been rocked, you extended a loving hand to Donna and other people in crisis.



## Nur Fatima

# Like Jesus, you ministered to the sick, delivering life-saving medical care for little Fatima.

Three-month-old Fatima was battling a cough for ten days before her mother brought her to a Medical Teams-supported clinic in the refugee camp where they live. She'd been treated at three other hospitals, but her cough wasn't improving and now a fever was burning in her little body. Her mother, Nur Nahar, was worried about her baby—"I feel scared when my baby is sick. I cried and immediately went to the doctors."

At the clinic, doctors evaluated Fatima and decided that she needed IV medication right away. They also saw she had an infection on her tongue that required treatment.

The medicine began to work quickly, bringing Fatima's fever down. After three days in the clinic, her cough was lessening.

Nahar felt confident in the care her daughter received, explaining that she was happy to see Fatima improving. She has three other children at home and plans to bring them to the clinic if they get sick.

The clinic, the medical staff, the medicine and supplies—all were available because of your compassionate giving.

For people across the Pacific Northwest, tooth pain is a cause for dread. Cost and access prevent many from getting to a dentist. Untreated, oral disease can lead to other health problems that affect a person's quality of life.

each patient with exceptional care. Basic
medical screenings and referrals help
people find treatment for health concerns
like high blood pressure and diabetes.

## Tim

## You were an answer to Tim's prayer to be relieved of pain.

Tim waited patiently onboard the Mobile Clinic van for the volunteer dentist to pull seven of his teeth. He'd been in pain for a long time. But relief was near.

"I was born with a hole in my heart," he said, sitting in the dental chair. A lifelong heart condition had affected the calcium in his teeth, leaving them weak and brittle. They'd begun to crack and break, causing him tremendous pain. Over the years, Tim had seen many dentists and doctors, but the burden of healthcare expenses was too much. His medical condition forced him to retire early and go on disability.

Without money to pay for dental care, Tim was faced with an uncertain future. Eating and drinking were too painful.

But, because of you, there was an end to Tim's pain. You helped provide free dental care. Clinic manager, Josh Mackey, went the extra mile for Tim and found a doctor to assess Tim's condition and clear him for extractions while on blood thinning medication for his heart.

With his teeth removed, Tim is now free of pain and ready to be fitted for dentures so he can eat and drink again. "I like to live and laugh," he said joyfully. "I'm just really looking forward to a full smile."




# Your Gifts Are at Work Around the World

This year, refugee families torn apart by conflict, mothers and children sickened by preventable diseases, survivors of deadly hurricanes and wildfires—people who had lost everything—were given the critical medical care they so desperately needed. With your gifts, Medical Teams International was able to act and to heal, sharing God's love with His most vulnerable children.



Your gift made a life-changing difference for more than 175,000 refugees and vulnerable Tanzanians this year. Because of you, 212,841 primary health care consultations were provided to people in crisis and 5,922 babies were safely delivered.





Nearly a million Rohingya refugees live in crowded camps in Bangladesh, having fled violence and persecution in Myanmar. Thanks to you, 62,181 refugees were served through visits from Community Health Workers and primary health care consultations in 2020.



With your help, more than 36,400 refugees in Lebanon were reached by Refugee Outreach Volunteers in 2020. Refugee Outreach Volunteers taught their neighbors how to stay healthy, monitored people with chronic illnesses and shared health messaging on issues like mental health, breast cancer and COVID-19.



When the COVID-19 pandemic began, you stepped up for your neighbors in the U.S. You helped ensure dental care remained available to people in pain and eased the burden on hospital emergency rooms. Over 10,000 people were screened or tested for COVID-19 in Oregon and Washington.



This year, you helped build a foundation for delivering life-saving medical care to Venezuelan migrants in Colombia. Because of your support, community assessments were conducted, identifying people in crisis who need care, especially pregnant women and children.



For Liberians, your gifts brought healing and hope for a healthier future. You helped support and train 171 Community Health Workers and staff. These specially trained teams monitored Liberians for infectious disease, providing much-needed support to the burdened national health system. In remote areas, you helped bring greater access to important health services through the construction of youth-friendly corners at local health facilities.

# Medical Supplies

Sometimes just being able to get to a clinic or hospital isn't enough. In many places, doctors, nurses and midwives lack basic medical supplies to care for their patients. If a hospital doesn't have IV supplies or a surgeon doesn't have sterile equipment, lives are put at risk.

Your support helps fill this gap by shipping medical supplies that prevent infection and keep people healthy. With the help of a team of volunteers, donated medical supplies are sorted, packed and shipped. Because of you, health facilities here and around the world are equipped to save lives.



## Florence

## In those critical moments for Florence and her baby, you were there.

Florence was pregnant with her sixth child when she began experiencing labor pains late one afternoon. She went to see her mother who sent for a local midwife. The midwife saw that the labor wasn't progressing—the baby was too big, and the contractions weren't coming quickly enough. Florence couldn't deliver at home. It was time to get help.

Florence was taken to a Medical Teams clinic where health care workers saw that Florence had several complications. Her labor was obstructed, and the baby was poorly positioned. The midwife on duty could tell mother and baby were deteriorating so she immediately called for an ambulance.

Within minutes, the ambulance was rushing Florence to another hospital. Medical Teams surgeon, Dr. Sarah Akite, examined her right away. A scan showed the baby was in severe distress—Florence needed an emergency C-section.

Dr. Akite and her assistant got to work, not knowing whether mother and baby would survive.

When the baby was delivered, he was quiet, and his arm hung limply. But, thankfully, within seconds he let out a cry. He'd made it.



Florence and her baby boy were discharged to the maternal health facility next door where they received post-op care. She smiled as she held her son saying, "Thank you, Medical Teams, for taking care of me and my baby. I thank God for saving my life."

Your support provided the ambulance, the surgical equipment and the skilled medical staff to keep Florence and her baby alive. Because of you, what could have been one family's tragedy turned to their joy.

# Volunteers

Most of our volunteers come from the communities where we serve. Refugees learn how to spot disease and check on their neighbors. Mothers learn about prenatal and newborn care and share their knowledge with other mothers. Health messages reach more people, and more lives are saved because of community volunteers.

International volunteers also play an essential role. Specially trained volunteers deploy at the beginning of a sudden crisis. After a disaster, doctors and nurses support local health care workers and provide medical care. In the U.S., local volunteers give generously of their time to sort and pack medical supplies and to provide urgent dental care and COVID-19 testing.



Your gifts helped provide Raghda's training, empowering her to monitor the health of her family and neighbors in the refugee camp where she lives.

Before fleeing Syria, Raghda had finished school and had dreams of being a teacher. When she and her family were uprooted to Lebanon, Raghda, a mother of five, felt depressed and lonely. She'd escaped the violence in Syria but now an uncertain future stretched out in front of her.

When she learned about becoming a volunteer with Medical Teams, she was sure the new opportunity would change her family's life.



Volunteering helped rebuild her confidence. She began to think of new possibilities and the routine of her work brought order to her days again.

Raghda now shares critical health information with other refugees—where to find health consultations, how to breastfeed and how to recognize the signs of diabetes or hypertension. She encourages mothers to take their children for vaccinations.

"I believe a smile is always printed on my heart when a mother thanks me for helping to give her child better health," she says.

# Carla

Last spring, as Medical Teams supported local healthcare systems overloaded by the COVID-19 pandemic, volunteer Carla Scroggins stepped up to the plate. A paramedic and mother of two boys, Carla didn't shy away from the risky work of screening patients visiting the Mobile Dental Clinics.

She knew the clinics were important to reduce the burden on emergency rooms and to make sure vulnerable people still had access to dental care. This is the selfless love that Medical Teams volunteers like Carla demonstrate. It's just who they are.

When asked why she got involved, Carla said, "I think this [time] is tough on everybody, so I thought volunteering with Medical Teams would be a good way to serve at least within my community."

As a paramedic, Carla has the skills to screen patients for COVID-19 symptoms. She has generously shared her medical skills by volunteering both in the U.S. and as part of an Emergency Health Services team in Nepal in 2015.

Around the world, devoted volunteers like Carla work in difficult situations, often faced with uncertainty and risk. But they continue to step up, serving their brothers and sisters in Christ and bringing healing where it's needed most.

# Corporate & Foundation Partners

Our Corporate and Foundation partners were invaluable allies in a year where the unexpected became the norm. Working together, our partners proved we can achieve far more together than we can alone.

When the COVID-19 pandemic struck the Pacific Northwest in March 2020, **Providence Health and Services - Oregon, Swedish Medical Center,** and **MultiCare Health System** each provided generous funding and hosted drive up COVID-19 testing clinics.

The compassion of our corporate partners also brought relief after Oregon's massive wildfires displaced thousands of families. Reser's Fine Foods, Cambia Health Solutions, A-dec, Goodwill Industries of the Columbia Willamette, and Becton, Dickinson and Company contributed funds to provide hygiene kits to evacuees.

Around the world, our partners' contributions aided efforts to slow the spread of COVID-19. In Guatemala, a struggling health system and a lack of basic hygiene and sanitation put many people at risk.

Thanks to the generosity of **Becton, Dickinson** and **Company,** essential health supplies arrived in Guatemala City at the start of the pandemic. These supplies helped equip a 3,000-bed hospital for treating patients with COVID-19.

Through our continued partnership with **Providence Global & Domestic Engagement,** we worked to slow the spread of the virus in rural Guatemala by delivering handwashing stations. Families who previously did not have access to handwashing were able to help slow the spread of infection in their communities.

In Uganda, Medical Teams was well-positioned to respond to COVID-19 because of experience responding to infectious diseases and our partnership with the **Sanofi Espoir Foundation**. When the Ebola virus surged in Uganda in 2019, Sanofi helped protect refugee children and families by funding medical screenings and essential supplies. They also helped provide personal protective equipment and isolation and screening tents, which allowed staff to treat people safely. These infection prevention measures proved invaluable when COVID-19 hit.

Responding with urgency and compassion, our corporate and foundation partners continue to be unified in our mission to bring hope and healing where it's needed most. Because of the generosity of our partners, our work continues forward and lives are saved.

The McDougalls are intentional about their giving and take time to talk about it together nearly every year. "The work of Medical Teams is so important. We enjoy being engaged in this important work!"


